## **FY 2013 Transportation Appropriations**

FY 2013 transportation funding to be guided by SAFETEA-LU reauthorization.

### Senate Transportation Appropriations

- \$300 million funding increase over FY 2012
- Level funding for federal highway programs \$39.14 billion
- \$96 million increase for mass transit programs \$10.7 billion
- Increased funding for New Starts program by \$88 million
- Fund the TIGER grant program \$500 million
- Fund the HSIPR grant program \$100 million
- Fund the Sustainable Communities Initiative \$50 million



- · Awaiting action
- House FY 2013 budget would cut transportation program funding by ~40%

### **SAFETEA-LU Reauthorization Timeline** House and Senate begin SAFETEA-LU Enacted conference discussions on Senate approves (2005 - 2009)SAFETEA-LU successor bill S. 1813 (MAP-21) March 14, 2012 April 18, 2012 Current extension of SAFETEA-LU expires House approves Nine extensions HR 4348 covering over two years since SAFETEA-LU expired Holland & Knight



# SAFETEA-LU Reauthorization - Project Delivery

### **Project Delivery**

- · Provisions included in House and Senate bills.
- Senate language would expand the use of innovative contracting methods, allow for early right-of-way acquisition, reduce bureaucratic hurdles for projects with no significant environmental impact and encourage early coordination between relevant agencies.
- House language would allow all states to substitute their environmental laws for NEPA if the Secretary of Transportation deems such laws to be substantially equivalent to NEPA.

# SAFETEA-LU Reauthorization - New Funding



- Transit Oriented Development: \$20 million
  - MAP-21 would require FTA to consider mixed use, transit-oriented development in awarding federal transit funding.
  - The bill would also create a new \$20 million grant program to provide funding to communities to assist with TOD.



- ITS Deployment: \$50 \$100 million
  - MAP-21 would authorize a competitive grant program to deploy ITS technologies and strategies aimed at reducing traffic congestion.



- Projects of National and Regional Significance: \$1 billion
  - MAP-21 would establish a grant program for large-scale highway, transit and intermodal projects.

# SAFETEA-LU Reauthorization – New Funding



- Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation (TIFIA): Funding increased
  - ➤ Increased from \$122 million to \$1 billion annually



- Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing (RRIF): Modified
  - Would allow applicants to use future dedicated revenues as collateral to help secure a RRIF loan.
  - Expands the type of projects eligible under the program to include positive train control and pre-construction activities.

  - > Increase profile of SMCTA projects
