Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day: Take a Virtual Walk Through History!



On November 14*, 1960, six-year old Ruby Bridges integrated William Frantz Elementary School in New Orleans, Louisiana. Ruby's simple but courageous act of showing up for school each day, despite the vitriol she faced, played an important role in the Civil Rights Movement. In spring of 2018 a group of 5th graders from Martin Elementary school in South San Francisco Unified School District were so inspired by Ruby's courage that they asked their school board to pass a resolution making November 14th Ruby Bridges Day in SSFUSD. The San Mateo County Office of Education Safe Routes to School team met with the students about making it

a walk to school day and a movement was born. Safe Routes to School programs across the country have helped promote this new walk to school day. Since the first event was held in 2018, Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day has grown exponentially with more schools participating each year. The 2020 event was the 1st national RBWTSD with schools across the country participating, even in the midst of a pandemic! This year the California State Senate passed a resolution recognizing RBWTSD and Ruby Bridges restarted her foundation, making RBWTSD the centerpiece of her foundation's work!

An inspirational presentation by the 2018 Martin Elementary 5th graders and their desire to recognize and celebrate the courage of a 6 year old was the catalyst for Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day. It started right here in San Mateo County and caught the imagination of school children across the county and across the country!

This year's RBWTSD takes place on November 17th. Thank you for your support of this day! Have a good walk!


